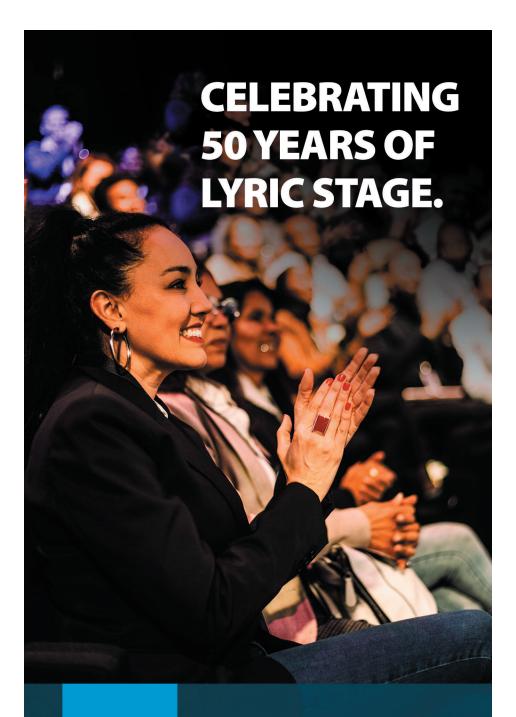

FROM THE PRODUCING ARTISTIC DIRECTOR & DIRECTOR OF THIRST



Dear Lyric Stage family,

Eighteen-year-old Anna Murray Lowry arrived at Ellis Island from Roscrea, County Tipperary on May 6, 1893, along with her 19-year-old brother, Patrick. Within a few years, she was a servant in the wealthy Steel family household in Philadelphia, PA. And during the summers, "our Annie" (as she was affectionately called by the family) was the main housekeeper at their summer residence in the nearby suburb of Doylestown.

(One day, as some young men were painting the house, someone inside cheekily called out and asked if there were any single men for Anna. Thomas Courtney answered and the rest, as they say, is history. At least, it's my history.)

Reading Ronán's play, things deep inside my soul began to immediately stir and sing. I feel an undeniable connection to these women and their heartbreak, their laughter, their dark humor, their stubborness, and their dreams — even if I often burn toast and am afraid to cook chicken. They are what made me possible — they are my greatgrandmother and her sisters — who all eventually came over and worked as servants. And Jack's truly American spirit, drive, and determination? That's a part of me, too.

(Of course, their darkness is also a part of me. Anna's brother Patrick died far too young, lost to alcohol. And the records of Anna's father's arrests for public drunkeness are plentiful. Things I remind myself of as I debate whether to have another glass of wine.)

What a joy it has been to delve into these complicated and challenging servants. The lives of those behind the kitchen wall were as complex and vibrant as those they served. My deep thanks to Ronán for opening the door and bringing us all into the kitchen, and letting us spend a long day's journey into morning with these three fascinating characters.

A NOTE FROM THE PLAYWRIGHT OF THIRST

In my experience it takes approximately five years of settling into America before you realize it's your home now and it's time to put down roots. In fact, you can't apply to be a citizen until you've stayed for at least four years and nine months. There's a wisdom in that time limit.

With that in mind, I invite you to visualize this illustration, however cheap you find it: imagine the characters in this play as not unlike a plant that has been uprooted, with dangling roots, thin tendrils, covered in soil, following them, trailing after them wherever they go, whether it is from Connemara to Cork and from Cork to New York or New York to New London or beyond and watch as they struggle with the adaptation, desperation, grief, and joy of what it means to ultimately decide to put down those roots and learn to become an American.

This is the story of *Thirst*.

Other recent international productions have taken place in England, Spain, Canada, India, Scotland, the Philippines, and Ireland. His most recent play The Smuggler won the best playwright award at the First Irish Festival (New York) and played at the Irish Repertory Theatre (New York) in 2023. His full-length and one-act plays are published by TRW Publishing, Samuel French, Smith and Kraus, Baker Plays, and Dramatists Play Service. He is a recipient of the Elliot Norton Award for Outstanding Play and three-time recipient of the IRNE Award for Best New Play. His play The Second Girl had productions at the Contemporary American Theater Festival in Shepherdstown, WV, The Huntington, Boston (Campbell Scott, Directing). - Courtney joined the full-time staff of the Lyric Stage in 2018 and was named Artistic Director in 2020. She has directed several pieces for the Lyric Stage, including Stones in His Pockets, Red Hot Patriot, The Cake, Be Here Now, The Book of Will, Preludes, and Assassins. Courtney was a senior affiliated faculty member in Performing Arts at Emerson College for more than 20 years. In addition to directing for theatres and universities, Courtney has directed multiple site-specific productions at locations, including Mount Auburn Cemetery and Boston's Old State House. Through her work with the Coyote Theatre Project, she oversaw the creation of more than 200 new 10-minute plays written by youths from Boston. Courtney has received the Elliot Norton Award for her work as the Associate Director on the Lyric Stage's production of The Life and Adventures of Nicholas Nickleby and the Alan L. Stanzler Award for Excellence in Teaching.

or those familiar with his Pulitzer Prizewinning autobiographical masterpiece Long Day's Journey Into Night, Ronán Noone's play Thirst offers special rewards. O'Neill, who was born in 1888 and died just a few blocks from Lyric Stage in 1953, is often called "the Father of American drama." He is the only American playwright to receive the Nobel Prize for Literature. The author of nearly 60 plays, his period of greatest popular success extended from 1920 to 1933 when he was an international celebrity. But three late plays — The Iceman Cometh (1939), Long Day's Journey Into Night (1941, first produced in 1956), and A Moon for the Misbegotten (1943) — are considered his finest and most widely produced today.

Long Day's Journey Into Night is an almost documentary-like depiction of his family, with the character of Edmund representing Eugene himself "written

in tears and blood...with deep pity and understanding and forgiveness" It takes place in the O'Neill household in New London, CT in 1912, spanning from morning until midnight. The family is rechristened the Tyrones. O'Neill's father, James, a famed stage actor, was an Irish immigrant who grew up in harrowing poverty. O'Neill's mother, Mary Ellen, had been raised in a convent and dreamed of becoming a professional pianist. After the difficult birth of Eugene, she was prescribed morphine and struggled with an addiction to it for most of her life. Eugene's brother, Jamie, was a ne'er-dowell who spiraled into alcoholism. Eugene was diagnosed with tuberculosis that year, not long after his first suicide attempt. The play dramatizes their complex relationships trapped in a relentless cycle of shame, blame, guilt, and accusations, but not without love and compassion for "all the four haunted Tyrones."

O'Neill's play also includes two brief appearances by the housemaid, Cathleen — and a few references to a short-tempered family cook and a chauffeur, though the audience never sees them. Thirst invites you to do just that...and to see some comedy taking place on the other side of the wall of the famed modern tragedy.

Eugene O'Neill felt that "it was a great mistake, my being born." His characters are frequently outsiders who long to belong — those he called "fog people" or "pipe dreamers." O'Neill offered them dignity, respect, and understanding. Ronán Noone offers that same kind of grace, as well as humor and hope, to three characters who previously lived offstage in the shadows of America's greatest drama.

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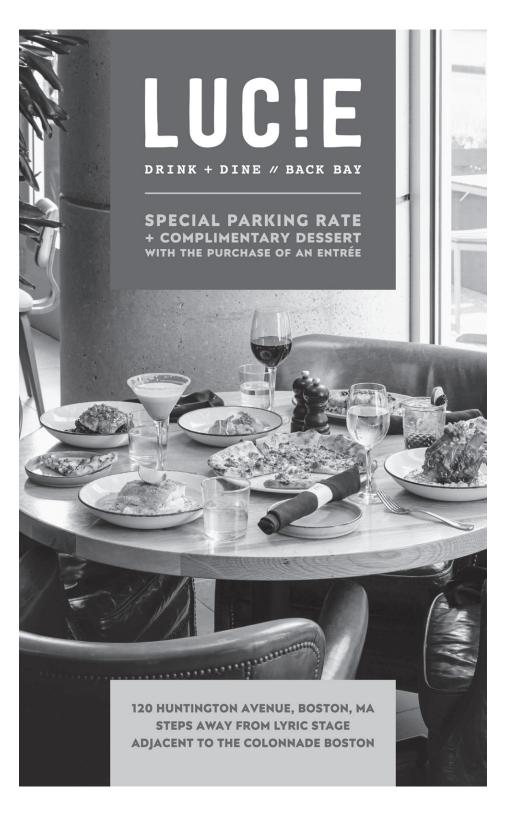
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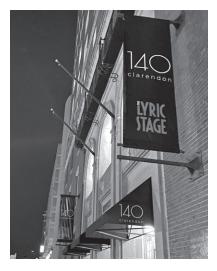
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ABOUT YOUR THEATRICAL HOME:

140 CLARENDON STREET



The Lyric Stage Company of Boston produces the majority of its work at 140 Clarendon Street, the historic YWCA Building, which resides on the land of the Massachusett and Pawtucket Peoples.

The Massachusett Peoples are the descendants of the original people that the English first encountered in what is now the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The Pennacook tribe, sometimes called Pawtucket and Merrimack Indians, lived in northeastern Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire. The Nipmuc Peoples occupied the interior portion of what is now Massachusetts and parts of Rhode Island and Connecticut. The Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe has inhabited present day Massachusetts and Eastern Rhode Island for more than 12,000 years.

140 Clarendon Street is also the home of YW Boston, formerly known as the YWCA Boston, an organization that was at the forefront of many social movements throughout the history of the city of Boston. YWCA Boston was first established in 1866, and began operating out of 140 Clarendon Street in 1927. YWCA helped propel many programs and initiatives for young women across the country, such as sex education, women's suffrage advocacy, bilingual instruction for immigrant women, the International Conference of Women Physicians, and the Interracial Seminar. Today, YW Boston's work focuses on addressing racial and gender inequities through a variety of diversity, equity, and inclusion services, youth programming, advocacy, and more.

In 1991, the Lyric Stage moved to 140 Clarendon Street from its former home on Charles Street. The current theater and adjacent offices were constructed on the second floor of the building, and a fourth floor rehearsal hall was added in 2016.

In 2021, YW Boston and its investment partners sold the building to Beacon Communities, who began the process of rehabilitating approximately 50,000 square feet of existing hotel and residential spaces into affordable housing units, health and wellness amenities, and offices for building management staff which will be operated in partnership with the Pine Street Inn. The building will contain approximately 210 apartments (an increase of 92 housing units) all of which will be income-restricted to households with incomes at or below 60% of the Area Median Income.

As a part of the sale, Beacon Communities and Lyric Stage negotiated a new 19-year lease, ensuring that 140 Clarendon Street will be the Lyric Stage's forever home.

The Lyric Stage Company of **Boston** produces and presents live theatre in Greater Boston with an intimate approach that promotes inclusivity and connection. The Lyric Stage leads an effort to integrate

live theater and theater education into the lives of all residents of Greater Boston.

Founded in 1974 by Ron Ritchell and Polly Hogan, the Lyric Stage is Boston's oldest resident theatre company. After establishing a loyal following on Charles Street, Ron and Polly led a successful 1991 campaign to create the Lyric Stage's current home on Clarendon Street. Polly was the chief negotiator for the NEAT (New England Area Theatres) contract, which made it easier for local producers to hire members of Actors Equity Association, the union for actors and stage managers.

In 1998, **Spiro Veloudos** was appointed Producing Artistic Director. During his tenure, he continued Ron and Polly's commitment to local artists; with few exceptions, the theatrical artists that work at the Lyric Stage live in the Greater Boston area. Spiro also established a reputation for staging large musicals in the Lyric Stage's modest playing space, including a signature Sondheim Initiative, which covered ten musicals over twenty years.

In 2016, the Lyric Stage opened Clarendon Hall, a yearround rehearsal space. Clarendon Hall is available at a subsidized rate to members of the Boston Dance Alliance and other arts organizations and individuals.

Theatre-based education has been a core of the Lyric Stage's mission since its founding. In 2019, the Lyric Stage merged with City Stage Co. and its expanded education programs include Lyric City Stage, teaching artists working in classrooms in the Boston Public Schools, the Lyric First Page playwriting festival for students, and the new Lyric Back Stage.

Following Spiro's retirement in 2019, the board appointed **Matt Chapuran** as Executive Director, and shortly after, Courtney O'Connor was named Artistic Director. In the fall of 2023, Courtney was appointed Producing Artistic Director, continuing the work centering Lyric Stage in Boston's theatrical community, introducing live theatre to new audiences, and promoting new theatrical voices in Boston and nationwide.
