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A NOTE FROM THE EXECUTIVE AND ARTISTIC DIRECTORS



Lyric Stage is a theatre for Boston artists. Because we cast everything locally and assemble all our creative teams with Boston-based artists, we have the fortune of watching careers ignite and grow.

In 2016, **Michael Hisamoto** was a student at Boston University when he was cast as Henry, a member of the gamblingaddicted family at the heart of our production of Carla Ching's *Fast Company*. He followed up his Lyric Stage debut with

memorable turns in *Stage Kiss* (2017) and *Orlando* (2018) but we're certain that nobody who saw him carry our 2017 production of *Hold These Truths* will forget the bravery, wit, and vulnerability he brought to his portrayal of Gordon Hirabayashi.

Since earning his Actors' Equity card, Michael was the Assistant Director of the Lyric Stage production of *Pacific Overtures*, and has always remained a friend to this company, particularly at times when friends are most needed. Michael has been everywhere in the last seven years, including work with the Huntington, Central Square Theater, SpeakEasy Stage, Wheelock Family Theatre, and Flat Earth Theatre. He's currently part of the creative team working to revitalize New Repertory Theatre in Watertown, and we are sure the folks at New Rep feel very lucky to have him.

Those that keep a close eye on such things may have read about the demise of StageSource, a service organization that provided needed glue for young graduates, including audition notices and professional development, as they worked to launch their theatrical careers in Boston. The news came as a stark reminder of how fragile the environment remains for the wildly creative members of Massachusetts' creative economy.

This spring, we are launching **Lyric Back Stage**, a new program intended to introduce middle and high school students in Boston to live theatre and to the variety of technical jobs that too often go unsung. We hope that this program and **Alexandra Smith**, our new Community Programs Manager, will help us formalize Lyric Stage's role in introducing live theatre and promoting the careers of those willing to make Boston their home. Everyone who buys a ticket, makes a donation, or just urges someone to come visit us helps us make these dreams a reality.

Matt is currently co-president of NEAT (New England Area Theatres), a bargaining collective of 12 regional theatres, and is a member of the Create the Vote Coalition and its Policy Platform working group. He currently teaches Arts Management at Emerson College. He has performed, taught, and directed improvisation for two decades, including as a part of Babson College's MBA program, as one half of The Angriest Show in the World. His short stories have appeared online in The Bookends Review, Bridge Eight, Prose Online, and Variant Literature. He lives in Roslindale with his wife and their three daughters.

Courtney O'Connor (Artistic Director) - Courtney joined the full-time staff of the Lyric Stage in 2018 and was named Artistic Director in 2020. She has directed several pieces for the Lyric Stage, including Preludes, The Book of Will, Stones in His Pockets, Red Hot Patriot, and The Cake. Courtney is a senior affiliated faculty member in Performing Arts at Emerson College. In addition to directing for theatres and universities, Courtney has directed multiple site-specific productions at locations, including Mount Auburn Cemetery and Boston's Old State House. Stanzler Award for Excellence in Teaching.

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et in 1989 against the rising demonstrations for political and economic reform in Tiananmen Square, *The Great Leap* by Lauren Yee explores the intersection of cultural identity and politics through basketball.

Tiananmen Square is known for being the center for the 1989 protests. On April 17, 1989, many students and protestors gathered at the square to mourn the death of Hu Yaobang, a political leader who was viewed as a martyr for the political liberalization of China. The students protested at this gathering for democracy, freedom of speech, and freedom of the press.

The Chinese government became increasingly uncomfortable as the protests grew, particularly after they disrupted a visit by Prime Minister Mikhail Gorbachev of the Soviet Union on May 15. By the end of May, protests and vigils became daily events at Tiananmen Square.

The government declared martial law on May 20, 1989, sending 250,000 troops to Beijing. The Tiananmen Square "June Fourth Incident" happened as army officials fired live rounds into the crowds, and tried to crush those in their way. Once the officials reached the square, a number of protestors decided to leave rather than face confrontation.

The "Tank Man" successfully slowed the army and delayed the protests by standing in front of the lead tank, and waving his right hand, signifying them to stop. While the tank tried to maneuver around him, the man repeatedly stepped into the tank's path to prevent it from moving forward. The "Tank Man" was removed by force by two men (possible government officials), and the tanks continued on their way. As of 2020, all "Tank Man" photos are banned from public view by the Chinese government.

PLAYWRIGHT LAUREN YEE'S INSPIRATION FOR THE GREAT LEAP

he Great Leap by Lauren Yee centers around a friendship game between Beijing University's and the University of San Francisco's men's basketball teams. The play is also inspired by Yee's father's own experiences of traveling to China to participate in these games.

"In 1981, China was open to the West, but it still wasn't a place that many, many Western tourists had been to yet. My father is sixfoot-one. He and his team got completely demolished in the exhibition games. I suspect they were brought there to lose because the Chinese could have brought an NBA or college team over. Asian-Americans at the NBA-level was still not a thing." Of her father, she said, "He was really helpful telling me about his experiences." Her father wasn't into watching basketball. "He's more into baseball." Unfortunately, there are no videos of those games. On stage, you'll see "a version of my father; it's not pretending to be him." (ASAM News, by Jana Monji)

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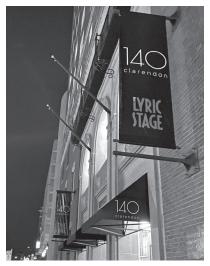
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about your theatrical home: 140 CLARENDON STREET



The Lyric Stage Company of Boston produces the majority of its work at 140 Clarendon Street, the historic YWCA Building, which resides on the land of the Massachusett and Pawtucket Peoples.

The Massachusett Peoples are the descendants of the original people that the English first encountered in what is now the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. The Pennacook tribe, sometimes called Pawtucket and Merrimack Indians, lived in northeastern Massachusetts and southern New Hampshire. The Nipmuc Peoples occupied the interior portion of what is now Massachusetts and parts of Rhode Island and Connecticut. The Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe has inhabited present day Massachusetts and Eastern Rhode Island for more than 12,000 years.

140 Clarendon Street is also the home of YW Boston, formerly known as the YWCA Boston, an organization that was at the forefront of many social movements throughout the history of the city of Boston. YWCA Boston was first established in 1866, and began operating out of 140 Clarendon Street in 1927. YWCA helped propel many programs and initiatives for young women across the country, such as sex education, women's suffrage advocacy, bilingual instruction for immigrant women, the International Conference of Women Physicians, and the Interracial Seminar. Today, YW Boston's work focuses on addressing racial and gender inequities through a variety of diversity, equity, and inclusion services, youth programming, advocacy, and more.

In 1991, the Lyric Stage moved to 140 Clarendon Street from its former home on Charles Street. The current theater and adjacent offices were constructed on the second floor of the building, and a fourth floor rehearsal hall was added in 2016.

In 2021, YW Boston and its investment partners sold the building to Beacon Communities, who began the process of rehabilitating approximately 50,000 square feet of existing hotel and residential spaces into affordable housing units, health and wellness amenities, and offices for building management staff which will be operated in partnership with the Pine Street Inn. The building will contain approximately 210 apartments (an increase of 92 housing units) all of which will be income-restricted to households with incomes at or below 60% of the Area Median Income.

As a part of the sale, Beacon Communities and Lyric Stage negotiated a new 19-year lease, ensuring that 140 Clarendon Street will be the Lyric Stage's forever home.

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LYRIC STAGE

The Lyric Stage Company of Boston produces and presents live theatre in Greater Boston with an intimate approach that promotes inclusivity and connection. The Lyric Stage leads an effort to integrate live theater and theater education into the lives of all residents of Greater Boston.

Founded in 1974 by **Ron Ritchell** and **Polly Hogan**, the Lyric Stage is Boston's oldest resident theatre company. After establishing a loyal following on Charles Street, Ron and Polly led a successful 1991 campaign to create the Lyric Stage's current home on Clarendon Street. Polly was the chief negotiator for the NEAT (New England Area Theatres) contract, which made it easier for local producers to hire members of Actors Equity Association, the union for actors and stage managers.

In 1998, **Spiro Veloudos** was appointed Producing Artistic Director. During his tenure, he continued Ron and Polly's commitment to local artists; with few exceptions, the theatrical artists that work at the Lyric Stage live in the Greater Boston area. Spiro also established a reputation for staging large musicals in the Lyric Stage's modest playing space, including a signature Sondheim Initiative, which covered ten musicals over twenty years.

In 2016, the Lyric Stage opened Clarendon Hall, a year-round rehearsal space. Clarendon Hall is available at a subsidized rate to members of the Boston Dance Alliance and other arts organizations and individuals.

Theatre-based education has been a core of the Lyric Stage's mission since its founding. In 2019, the Lyric Stage merged with City Stage Co. and its expanded education programs include Lyric City Stage, teaching artists working in classrooms in the Boston Public Schools, the Lyric First Page playwriting festival for students, and the new Lyric Back Stage.

Following Spiro's retirement in 2019, the board appointed **Matt Chapuran** as Executive Director, and shortly after, **Courtney O'Connor** was named Artistic Director. Their partnership centers Lyric Stage in Boston's theatrical community, introduces live theatre to new audiences, and promotes new theatrical voices in Boston and nationwide.
